

## WING HERITAGE PRIZE CROSSWORD Answers

### WANTAGE HOUSE

1A and 49D This building was the original Estate Office for 9D, named for the husband of his daughter.

### CASTLE HILL

3A and 48D One of Wing's oldest protected patches of land, where the cows like to climb to graze.

### COTTESLOE

8A This school has been renamed after a noble benefactor.

### LINSLADE

11A In 966 this place, neighbouring Wing, was gifted to 25D.

### JANE SEYMOUR

14A and 33A A lady famous for her royal husband and son. She nearly married a 17D.

### CHESTERFIELD

15A The name of the Lords of the Manor of Wing from 1709 until 1839.

### ASCOTT MANOR

19A and 43A The name of the estate first referred to in 1317, when occupied by the Sackvilles.

### LITTLE SELFRIDGES

20A and 51A The nickname of the shop owned in the early 20th century by the Pipers - it stood on the corner of Leighton Road and Rothschild Road.

### MILLER

23A The trade of the former occupant of the site in Church Street where once stood a garage and where there is now a small housing estate.

### THE ROYAL OAK

28A and 24A and 5D There used to be a pub on the estate of 27D. What was its name?

### WELLINGTON

30A The name of a World War II aircraft associated with Operational Training Unit 26.

### WING PARK

35A and 12A The area of land enclosed by 17D in the 16th Century, where once stood Wing Priory.

### OUVRY

39A The name of the Reverend of Wing Church from 1850 to 1885. One of the stained glass windows commemorates him.

### CHARLES COTES

40A and 31D In January 1906 the then new Village Hall was dedicated to the memory of this man.

### HELEYS' FIELD

48A and 52D The name of a piece of land next to the Recreation Ground. The family used to live at Burcott Hall Farm.

### CHARLOTTE COTTAGE

54A and 42D What is the name of the building built in 1884 to serve as a village hospital?

### MINSTER

55A It is thought that Wing Church was originally built as this type of church.

### MILLSTONES

57A Six of these are set in the ground under 41D/ 53D.

### THE QUEEN'S HEAD

2D and 38A and 58A Does HRH drink here?

### THE COCK INN

4D and 26D and 34A Watering hole for an early bird?

### PELHAM

6D The surname of Lady Dorothy, who had a row of houses built in Wing in the late 16th Century.

### SAXON

7D One of the first inhabitants of Wing?

### OVERSTONE

9D This Lord built one of Wing's schools in 1850.

### LITTLEWORTH

11D The name of the small settlement in Wing in which once stood shops, a pub and a chapel - now a road of houses.

### JUBILEE GREEN

13D and 36D Celebratory name for a hidden park.

### JOSEPH HEADY

14D and 47A The architect of the Village Hall who also worked as a carpenter for the 27D.

### EVELYN

16D A road of houses is a permanent reminder of a mother's love for her courageous son. What was his name?

### DORMER

17D The family name of Lords of the manor from 1515 to 1709.

### THETIS

21D The name of the ship on which several Wing families emigrated to New South Wales in 1848.

### CARNARVON

22D One of the ringers was cast for this nobleman, after his death in 1643 at the Battle of Newbury.

### \*AELGIFU

25D The original first lady of Wing who, in 975, left the church in her will to King Edgar.

### ROTHSCHILDS

27D The present occupiers of the converted Jacobean farmhouse on the outskirts of Wing that is now a National Trust property.

**HORNERS' CORNER**

29D and 26A The former pub "the Dove" is situated on the A418 opposite the Recreation Ground. What nickname was given to this part of the road in the 19th century?

WENGE

30D One of the old spellings of Wing.

WILLIAM BANDY

32D and 18A.

WAR MEMORIAL

37D and 46A Where names of courage are set in stone.

LYCH GATE

41D and 53D Upon what is inscribed the motto "SIC DEUS DILEXIT MUNDUM"?

ALL SAINTS

44D and 10D Worship is dedicated to them.

MORTAIN

45D The original Lord of the Manor of Wing with Crafton in the 11th Century.

ALMS

50D What kind of houses were built by 6D?

NEW

56D The road dedicated to 27D was formerly known as \_\_\_ Road.

\* This royal lady was actually named AELGIFU. Sincere apologies for those who knew this and filled in the answer as "AELGIFU" anyway! The name is derived from the Olde English for "elf" which is "AEIf" and for "gift" which is "giefu". The transition from handwritten draft to computer caused the "F" to disappear!

WING HERITAGE GROUP MAP QUIZ ANSWERS

- 1) Before road widening, where was a Saxon mound?  
**In the field opposite the top of Well Lane.**
- 2) Which road was formerly known as New Road?  
**Rothschild Road**
- 3) In the 1830s Thomas Adams was murdered by his son in Burcott, but where is his grave?  
**All Saints churchyard.**
- 4) Where is the mile post at the edge of the village?  
**Approaching Wing from Aylesbury, on the left, between Mill Cottages and the roundabout by Cottesloe School.**
- 5) Where was The Honourable Seymour Fortescue, Equerry to his Majesty, staying as a 'Visitor' on the 1901 Census?  
**Ascot House**
- 6) The former fiancé of Henry VIII's third wife, Jane Seymour, lived in a house with terraced gardens on this site.  
**The Dormer family lived in a house in the wooded area just above the terraces near 'Garden Pond', which is situated on the land to the left of the road as you leave Wing at Parkgate, in the direction of Mentmore. William Dormer was engaged to Jane Seymour as a teenager.**
- 7) Where are the stables of the former house of the Earl of Orkney?  
**On Church Street, to the right of the entrance to Cottesloe School and Carey Lodge. The Earl of Orkney lived at a property on this site called 'Wing Lodge' at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.**
